This book is an abridged version and the price is almost the same. I see no reason to buy this book, instead of the full version. The title is deceivingly the same: Instead of "The Basics," but "Lessons". In the Preface of this book, they basically suggest you to buy the full version. I bought the book by mistake and felt deceived. I called , returned, and bought the full version.

The book is fantastic. Hardly thicker than Strunk&White, it couldnâ Â™t be more different. Real advice, understandable explanations, illuminating examples, and a wide scope of relevant topics.

Refreshingly, Williams eschews trite pearls of wisdom; he in fact devotes ample space to educate the reader about counterexamples to classical dogma, cases where opinions rehashed by venerated â Âœauthoritiesâ Â• really hurt. Yes, short sentences are great, but if you canâ Â™t write a long sentence thatâ Â™s also understandable, youâ A™re like a composer who cannot produce anything but jingles. Yes, using an active voice makes your writing more forceful and direct, but you will surprisingly often encounter situations where a passive construction is significantly preferable, for it eases the flow of information. (Besides, being forceful and direct is not always a virtue.) And yes, youâ Â™re on a good path if you can write good sentences, but if you canâ Â™t create cohesion between them, and coherence over a whole paragraph, your writing will remain opague. $I\tilde{A}c\hat{A} \hat{A}^{TM}m$ even in the target audience of the book: itâ Â[™]s not written for poets, itâ Â[™]s for people who need to communicate information (academics, journalists, but probably foremost: college students learning how to write essays). Hence, many examples are not too far away from what I deal with on a day-to-day basis, when writing grants, papers, or referee reports. The book closes with a beautiful reminder to those who donâ Â[™]t know why to bother with good writing, when thereâ Â[™]s so much terrible writing going around. I quote: â ÂœWhat experienced readers know, and you eventually will, is that clear and graceful writers are so few that when we find them, we are desperately grateful. They do not go unrewarded." If that's no motivation to care, then I don't know what is. Thereâ Â™s so much in this book that I lovedâ Â"lessons, attitude, motivation, and moreâ Â"that I can confidently recommend it to anyone who cares to improve their writing. What I donâ Â[™]t know yet, though, is whether the longer version of the book, â ÂœStyle: Lessons in Clarity and Graceâ Â•, is even better, or says the same in more words and on more pages. But I will find out!

My graduate adviser got me this book while preparing my masters thesis. It's short enough that it doesn't look intimidating. The tone really feels like having a conversation with the author. It's peppered with abundant examples, occasionally getting a little meta by doing something and then saying "See what I did there?" to make a point. It's not hard or burdensome to read. The last couple chapters are of little use unless you're already a decent writer, but are nice to have. Pretty stellar book overall.

Clear, consistent, repetitive, cohesive text with many perspectives and samples both supporting and contrasting the principles presented. Each section incorporates and builds on the previous.
