
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Perfectly Ridiculous: A Universally Misunderstood Novel (Perfectly Dateless)

"Perfectly Ridiculous" will make a fun summer read for teens to enjoy as it will provide light entertainment. Daisy Crispin just graduated from high school. Claire, her best friend, wants to take Daisy on a free vacation to Argentina. Only issue is that Daisy needs to do a week of mission work for her school. Daisy's parents are not easily convinced to allow her to incorporate her mission requirements and a summer vacation to Argentina. They eventually agree but insist on tagging along. Daisy has made plans to meet up with her Argentinian boyfriend named Max. She is guickly disappointed in Max and his behavior towards her after she arrives in Argentina. Though it isn't clearly written they break up before they even become a couple. Daisy meets another young man named J.C. They happen to be attending the same college in the fall. J.C. gets injured and has to return to the US early. Though he ends up by not leaving. There are several chapters of weirdness that happens that involve Daisy, J.C., Max and Rosalina. The whole premise of the story is Daisy and her mission requirement, though she spends very little time at the Mission. The leader, Libby, seems to have formed an instant dislike towards her. Then Libby suddenly demands that Daisy leave the Mission immediately. Why did the author even put it in the book? Max is back in the picture and Daisy discovers he is engaged. Then discovers her parents are wealthy and money is not an issue for them. The next thing I am reading, Max is not engaged to Rosalina and he and Daisy are an item again? The storyline is decent just very unorganized and scattered. I never knew what what was truly going on. The "shocking" twists in the plot at the end just added more confusion and were too random. Parts of the book are narrated via Daisy's travel diary and made no sense as Daisy is actually telling the story. Though there are some issues with how the story is written "Perfectly Ridiculous" did provide me with some enjoyment as Billerbeck did an exceptional job in describing Argentina. I have had this book since last August, tried to read it then and put it aside. I recently found it and thought I would give it another try. With all that said, if you are looking to be kept on the edge of your seat with something new and different, this isn't the book for you.

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
